ULTRA LOW EMISSION HVO FLEET TAKES TO THE ROAD

Babergh and Mid Suffolk are the first rural UK councils to switch their fleet to Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil (HVO) which cuts carbon emissions by up to 90% and supports the councils' carbon neutral aims.



The councils' waste fleet has begun its transfer over to HVO. Its 35 waste lorries are the first to transfer and will be followed by its smaller public realm and housing services vehicles.

By ditching diesel, there will be a significant reduction in pollutant emissions from the fleet, with up to 90% reduction in CO_2 . It will also support a circular economy as the certified sustainable HVO fuel is solely produced from waste cooking oil.

The move was approved by the councils' cabinets in January this year and forms a major step in their Carbon Reduction Management Plan which sets out how the aim of net zero carbon emissions will be achieved by 2030. Before HVO, the fleet represented just over a quarter (26%) of the councils' total CO_2 emissions - approximately 880 tonnes per year – which will now reduce immediately.

> VILLAGE BENEFITS FROM THE COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY

What is the Community Infrastructure Levy, or CIL?

CIL is a relatively new levy that local authorities can charge on developments in their area, not only to encourage local development but also to make sure that the infrastructure in the region can afford to keep up with new homes and businesses. CIL is payable on permitted development as well as planning permission development when the development is commenced. The relevant legislation is the Community Infrastructure Regulations 2010 (as amended).

The majority of this levy is used by county and district councils in areas such as roads and schools but a small portion is paid to parish councils to help them develop community facilities. A couple of years ago Wattisfield Parish Council received $\pounds 3,949$ in respect of a development and more recently a further $\pounds 3,354$ in respect of the development of the eight houses on The Street. A further $\pounds 10,062$ is due from this development over the coming years.

The parish council are to a certain extent restricted on how they can spend these funds. At the moment the parish council have ring fenced the funds for the repairs to the village hall or possibly a rebuild. As you may be already aware, the parish council are working with the village hall trustees in setting up a working group to look at the repair or rebuild options. These CIL funds will be a useful sum to assist in getting this project moving. The parish council will also be able to apply to Mid Suffolk District Council for further CIL funds held in a central pot.

There will be more about the village hall repair or rebuild project over the coming months.

WATTISFIELD TOWN TRUST


The Wattisfield Town Trust administers land and funds given to the parish many years ago. The income from these is used for the benefit of residents of the village.
